Recovery At A Glance–Jackson County June 1, 2021

(As of May 31, 2021, unless otherwise noted)

- 1,773 individuals and households have been approved for more than \$27 million in federal grants through FEMA's Individuals and Households Program.
- More than \$30 million in U.S. Small Business Administration low-interest disaster loans have been approved for 257 homeowners and renters and 18 businesses as of May 28.

Housing Assistance:

- More than \$22.3 million in grants approved for housing repairs or replacement for 1,305 homeowners.
- More than \$4.7 million in grants have been approved for personal property, transportation and other disaster-related serious needs for 1,486 applicants.
- 2,576 home inspections have been issued with 99 percent completed.

Direct Temporary Housing

- Jackson County was approved to participate in FEMA's Direct Temporary Housing Program along with four other counties: Linn, Lane, Lincoln and Marion Counties.
- FEMA plans to restore fire-damaged commercial parks located in Jackson County where additional temporary housing units may be placed. Currently, three commercial parks are being restored for use, this is a labor-intensive process. These sites could be completed as early as June.
- Temporary housing is provided one of two ways: recreational vehicles (RVs) and Manufactured Housing Units (mobile homes).
- Survivor housing units are chosen by FEMA based on the survivor family composition and needs, as well as to ensure that requirements for access or functional needs are met.
- Ongoing participation in the program, which can last until March 2022, depends on each survivor's efforts to find a permanent housing solution and following the rules established by the park and FEMA.



Public Assistance

• As of June 1, FEMA has obligated 37 Project Worksheets and more than \$1.2 million in Public Assistance funding in Jackson County.
